The Cycle Challenge by President Nicole Friesen

One of the things I really enjoy about teaching is that everything comes and goes in cycles. There is a definite beginning and a definite end. There is a time to work hard and push to get things done and there is a time to step back and rejuvenate. Cycles provide the perfect opportunity for a fresh start, for reflection and evaluation, and for developing new habits.

For teachers, August signals the start of many new cycles. It's the beginning of a new year. It's the beginning of a new unit. It's the beginning of a new group of students. It can be the beginning of a whole new classroom experience for you and your students.

Sometimes we try something new and it's more difficult than we anticipated. A number of years ago I decided that I was going to try to recognize each student's birthday. No cupcakes or singing a corny song. I just wanted to say happy birthday as they walked in the room. My goal was to make sure each of my students knew that they were important to me and that I valued their presence in my classroom. Due to the fact that there wasn't an easy way to print a birthday list, that endeavor went out the window about mid-October. Yeah for the 10% of my students who had smiles on their faces when I surprised them by knowing it was their birthday, but I felt like a failure because I had missed the rest.

Sometimes we try something new and it doesn't go according to plan. Does anyone remember the first time they tried to use a SMART board in front of students? How about the time you spent hours crafting a brand new 90-minute lesson and they knocked the entire thing out in 15 minutes?

Then there are the moments that you're watching your students and screaming a silent "YES!" You tried something new and it worked beautifully. The AVID strategy that you didn't think would help your classroom ended up working like a charm. Switching to an online LMS made it easier for students to complete homework and for you to grade that homework¬¬¬¬¬¬. Or maybe you had an experience similar to mine. I had used bell ringers intermittently for years, but never on a regular basis in all of my classes. There was no good reason why I hadn't, it just seemed like that one little thing couldn't be that important. Last year I told myself that I would try it for one unit, the first unit, in each of my classes. Class went so much smoother I ended up using them the entire year and never looked back.

Here is my challenge to you. Find an area that you need to work on and commit to making a change for one cycle. You're not committing to it for the rest of your career or even the entire school year. You're committing for one cycle. That cycle can be one week, one grading period, one unit, one month. It's up to you. Make sure you take the time to evaluate at the end. Did it go well? Keep doing it and share with other teachers how it has improved your classroom. Was it a total flop? Scrap it. You only committed for that time period and you are free to move on. There is a list below of things you might think about trying. It's certainly not an exhaustive list, but hopefully it will help you think of something new you want to try. Use these ideas or steal an idea from another teacher. You don't have to reinvent the wheel. Feel free to borrow a wheel.

The Cycle Challenge, continued

You could even steal a wheel. I promise, no one will tell. However, if you can find a way to incorporate Pokemon Go into your classroom, you might not want to let anyone steal that idea—it's going to be worth some money.

New things to try:

- 1) Have students fill out exit tickets before they can leave your room
- 2) Make a commitment to greet each of your classes at the door instead of scrambling to get the classroom straightened up
- 3) Change the layout of your classroom so it flows better
- 4) Commit to talking to each student's parent during the first grading period
- 5) Use bell work as part of your classroom procedures
- 6) Use that supplemental material you have been telling yourself you are going to try
- 7) Find a new way to incorporate CTSO activities into your classroom
- 8) Try a new online resource like Edmodo, Schoology, Kahoot, etc.
- 9) Set a goal of sending an encouraging email to one faculty member each week.
